MUSIC POLICY

MISSION STATEMENT

At Christ Church CE Primary School we aim for all children to experience a broad, balanced and rewarding music education by providing children with knowledge, understanding and enjoyment of music through combined experiences of performance, composition, listening and appraising as stipulated by the National Curriculum.

Music is a powerful focus for creative energy, thus stimulating and guiding the imagination. It is a vital part of any primary curriculum as it underpins many aspects of generic learning, such as the ability to listen carefully, to explore feelings and responses to stimuli, to appraise, to take risks and to work as part of a team.

<u>AIMS</u>

- to develop confidence and enthusiasm in the children's approach to music by providing a fun but challenging music curriculum
- to perform, listen to, appraise and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great musicians
- to learn to sing and to use their voices, to compose and create music on their own and with others, to have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument, to use technology appropriately and to have the opportunity to progress to the next level of music excellence
- to understand and to explore how music is created, produced and communicated including through the inter-related dimensions: pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate notation
- to use the National Curriculum guidelines to underpin teaching and learning to suit the needs of our children.

PLANNING

EY focus:

- **ELG:** To be imaginative and creative: to sing, to perform songs and to move in time to music.
- To listen and to respond to music, identifying and keeping to a steady pulse.
- ELG: To manage self: to be confident to try new things
- **ELG:** To build relationships: to work co-operatively with others.

KS1 focus:

- to use their voices expressively and creatively by singing songs and speaking chants and rhymes
- to play tuned and un-tuned musical instruments musically
- to listen with concentration and understanding to a range of high-quality live and recorded music
- to experiment with, create, select and combine sounds using the inter-related dimensions of music

KS2 focus:

to play and perform in solo and ensemble contexts, using their voices and using musical instruments with increasing accuracy, control, fluency and expression

- to improvise and to compose music for a range of purposes using the inter-related dimensions of music
- to listen with attention to detail and to recall sounds with increasing aural memory
- to use and to understand staff and other notation
- to appreciate and to understand a wide range of high-quality live and recorded music drawn from different traditions and from great composers and musician
- to develop an understanding of the history of music

In the EYFS provision, music will be accessed daily with songs and rhymes for our younger children. This will progress to a longer lesson, introducing music to listen and respond to.

In KS1 and KS2 music will be taught weekly in all classes, guided by the New Curriculum. and teaching will be discrete, using the Charanga scheme of work for delivery. We aim to use music to foster links between church and community through regular joint events and through linking music teaching with the weekly assemblies given in school by the vicar team. Creating links between key stages to ensure a progressive education throughout school is also important to us.

Role of the music co-ordinator:

- to support the implementation of the school music policy
- to support the class teachers in their confidence and skill levels
- to initiate record keeping, tracking of musical learning experiences and guidance for differentiation
- to liaise between key stages
- to maintain contact with people outside school who provide advice or support, for example secondary liaison teachers, Edsential First Access and advisory teachers

- to attend courses or meetings whenever possible
- to keep updated with new initiatives that may enrich teaching and learning
- to organise INSET where appropriate
- to promote extra-curricular activities

Role of the class teacher:

- to plan, to deliver and to assess the National Curriculum music ensuring coverage of statutory requirements by following the school curriculum plan for music
- to keep the music co-ordinator informed of any resources required to deliver a unit of work
- to be aware of exceptional music talent and to encourage and to stimulate this talent as far as possible
- to be aware of children with additional needs and to provide for them as required

- Key Stage Assemblies
- church services 5 times a year
- KS1 nativity productions
- Y6 production
