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This policy is intended to ensure consistency across the school in terms of home learning practice.

Introduction

Homework can be described as anything that children do outside the normal school day that contributes to their learning and helps them to progress. Homework includes a whole variety of activities which can be set by teachers and parents/guardians to support the children's learning.

Rationale for homework

Homework is an important part of a child's education, and can add much to a child's development in addition to their school work. Homework plays a positive role in raising a child's level of attainment and the rate at which they make progress. We see homework as an important example of cooperation between teachers and parents/guardians. One of the aims of our teaching is for children to develop as independent learners and we believe that homework is one of the main ways in which children can acquire the skill of independent learning. However, we also acknowledge the important role of play and free time in a child's growth and development outside of the school day, so this policy aims to outline realistic homework expectations that compliment your child's whole development.

The homework policy is designed to:

- Provide opportunities for parents and children to work in partnership and to share and enjoy learning experiences.
- Consolidate and reinforce basic skills and knowledge, especially in English and Maths.
- Provide opportunities as children get older to develop skills of independent learning.
- To enable children to make maximum progress in their academic and social development
- To promote co-operation between home and school in supporting each child's learning
- To enable some aspects of the curriculum to be further explored independently
- To provide educational experiences not possible in school
- To consolidate school learning and to allow children to practice skills taught in lessons
- To help children develop good work habits for the future.
- To prepare Year 6 pupils for the transfer to secondary school.

What do we expect at Christ Church?

✚ Role of the Child

Children should make sure that where possible, homework is completed independently or with the guidance of their parents / guardians and within the deadline given. It is important, as they get older, for children to become increasingly independent in their learning.

✚ Role of the Parent / Guardian

Parents and guardians should support the school and encourage their children to complete their homework. They should provide a suitable place for their child to carry out their homework and praise their child when they have completed the homework. It is vital that parents display a positive attitude to homework and value its importance. It is also important for parents to recognise that it is the children's responsibility to complete the work. If parents/guardians have any problems or questions about homework, they should contact the child's class teacher via the year band email. If a parent is unsure about what their role should be, they should discuss it with their child's teacher.

✚ Role of the Teaching Staff

Teaching staff will upload homework on to the learning platform 'Seesaw Class' and provide an explanation of homework tasks to children and, when necessary, parents. Homework will be set weekly and teaching staff will ensure that it is purposeful and links to the curriculum being taught.

Feedback

Teaching staff will respond to homework through the app functions. These include 'like' or 'comment' and this will be followed up in class to address any misconceptions. Children will receive praise and rewarded positive points for regularly completing homework. As the children reach Year 5 and 6,

homework will become more challenging so that they can consolidate class learning and prepare for secondary school.

Inclusion and homework

At Christ Church, we set homework for all children as a normal part of school life. We ensure that all tasks set are appropriate to the ability of the child, and we endeavour to differentiate and adapt any task set so that all children can contribute in a positive way. Differentiation between homework can be identified through the icons displayed on the weekly homework overview sheet. The homework sheet is adapted to ensure it is age appropriate, please see Appendix 1 for an example.

Use of ICT for homework

Some of our homework tasks will be set using the See-Saw platform so that children can upload their work and staff can respond. A copy of the school's E-Safety policy is available from the school on request and may also be found on the school website. The child's safety is paramount in all matters regarding the use of the internet and we advise parents and carers to always supervise their child's access to the internet when undertaking homework tasks online. There are many websites containing highly educational material which can have a powerful effect on children's learning; Christ Church CE Primary School whole heartedly endorses the safe use of online educational material.

Expectations of homework

The nature, type and length of homework will vary according to the age of the child. At Christ Church, parents can expect the following homework:

Year 2	Challenges Reading	Reading and either maths or English - alternate weeks. Both reading and homework go out on a Friday. Reading back in the following Monday, homework by the following Wednesday
Year 3	Reading Maths English / Topic	One piece of English and one piece of maths every Friday to then be returned the following Wednesday. Reading at home at least 3x per week.
Year 4	English Reading Maths	One piece of English and one piece of maths every Friday to then be returned the following Wednesday. Reading at home at least 3x per week. Times tables Rock Stars Weekly
Year 5	Reading English	One piece of English and one piece of maths every Friday to then be returned the following Wednesday.

	Maths	Reading at home at least 3x per week.
Year 6	Maths English Reading	Maths on Friday, due in Wednesday Weekly revision of flashcards linked to maths vocabulary English set on Friday, due in Wednesday, weekly revision of flashcards linked to grammatical knowledge. Children are encouraged to read daily, but at least three times a week using AR book. AR books can be changed following online quiz.

Sanctions

Children who do not complete their homework may be asked to stay in to complete it at the discretion of the class teacher. If a child persistently does not complete homework then the teacher will contact parents and speak with them to encourage school and home to work in partnership for the benefit of the child.
